Stewardship of Our Spiritual Gifts

3 Things You Ought to Know about Spiritual Gifts:

1 - Each believer has received at least one spiritual gift

- ρ I Cor. 12:7-11; Romans 12:3-8; (Eph. 4:11- gifts of Christ)
- The gifts which were revelatory and have **ceased**: miracles, healing, tongues, interpretation of tongues, discerning spirits, word of wisdom, and word of knowledge.
- The **gifts** still functioning today: teaching, service, helps, faith, exhortation, showing mercy, giving, and administration.
- The gifts of the Spirit are given at **salvation** according to His will.
- "But one and the same Spirit works all these things, distributing to each one individually as He wills" (I Cor. 12:11).
- ρ We cannot **choose** our gift!
- ρ We may have natural abilities which we have received at birth: musical ability, craftsmanship, superior intellect, etc.
- ρ These natural talents or abilities are also from **God!**

2 - We must use our gift to minister to one another

- ρ Paganini's violin
- ρ The gifts we have received from the Spirit are meant to be used.
- "But the manifestation (gifts) of the Spirit is given to each one for the profit of all" (I Cor. 12:7).
- ρ It is love that drives the use of gifts "And above all things.... love."
- ρ We are to be good **stewards** of the gifts of the Spirit.
- ρ A good steward is a faithful steward (I Cor. 4:2).

3 - We must exercise our gift with the ability God supplies

- ρ Only when we serve in His **power** and with His enablement is He truly glorified.
- ρ When we are serving in our own strength or what we think is our own strength and ability, in all probability we are also serving for our own glory and recognition.
- ρ We must not serve to draw attention to ourselves.
- The gifts, talents, and abilities you have are all from God!

LESSONS FOR OUR LIVES:

- 1. Our spiritual gifts AND our natural abilities or talents are all from God.
- 2. Be a good steward of your spiritual gift by using it.
- 3. Serve God with the ability He supplies that He might be glorified, not you!
